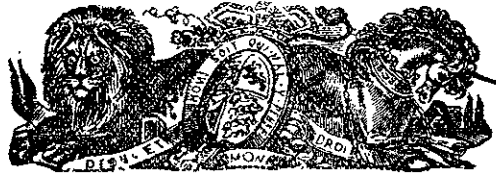

NOTICES.

1. *Police Gazette*.—All communications for the *Gazette* must be addressed to the Commissioner of Police, Brisbane; except *Reports of Offences committed*, which must be prepared on criminal offence forms, signed by the officer in charge of the district or station, and forwarded to the Detective Office with the least possible delay, with duplicate of warrant, if unexecuted.

2. *Stray Cattle*.—No advertisement of lost horses or cattle will be published in this *Gazette* unless they be Government property; but notices of horses or cattle stolen will be inserted gratuitously.

3. *Property Described*.—The brands of horses and cattle should be imitated as nearly as possible, and their exact positions given. In describing watches, it should be stated whether they are open-faced, hunting, double-cased, or half-hunting; the term "double-cased" being reserved for those watches whose outer case is removed in order to wind; "half-hunting" implying a very small glass in the metal cover of dial.

4. *Warrants*.—A duplicate of every warrant issued, and intended for publication in this *Gazette*, must accompany the criminal form forwarded to the Detective Office; and, when procurable, a photograph of the offender should be enclosed.

5. *Previous References*.—In cases already gazetted, officers in charge, or others concerned, will be good enough to quote the date and page of the *Police Gazette* in which the previous notice has appeared, and in reporting arrests, to state by whom effected.

6. *Members of the Police Force* are directed to peruse this *Gazette* carefully, and to notify to the Commissioner any information in reference to anything therein inserted of which they may be possessed.

7. No notice of reward offered by any private party or parties will for the future be inserted in the *Police Gazette*, unless there be forwarded to the Commissioner of Police the guarantee of some responsible person that the reward shall be payable according to law, on the arrest or conviction of the offender, and not merely for the recovery of property. If such notice be communicated by Telegraph, the addition of the words "guarantee received" will be sufficient; in such cases, however, the guarantee must be forwarded without delay.

SNAKE BITES.

NOTICE.

THE Police generally are directed to report all instances of snake-bite coming within their knowledge, together with the treatment adopted and the result thereof. The principal reason assigned for obtaining this information is to arrive at right conclusions as to the efficacy of the use of strychnine by hypodermic injection in cases of snake-bite, which, it is asserted authoritatively, has been to the present almost unfailling in apparently desperate cases, and it is considered that a full record of all instances of bites by snakes will be of great public utility.

RESERVE FOR POLICE PADDOCK.

Harrisville.

(In lieu of the Reserve established by Proclamation in the *Government Gazette* dated 21st November, 1891, page 1050, which is hereby amended.)

County of Churchill, parish of Flinders.

Area—About 13 acres 2 roods.

Commencing on the right bank of Normanby Gully at the south-west corner of portion 117, and bounded thence on the north by that portion bearing 97 degrees seven chains and ninety-nine links; on the east by a line bearing 187 degrees one chain

and eighty-seven and three-tenths links, again on the north by a line bearing 97 degrees five chains; on the south-east by a road bearing 207 degrees 30 minutes six chains and twenty-one links; on the south and east by lines bearing west six chains and south four chains; again on the south by a road bearing west three chains and fourteen links; thence by lines bearing north two chains and seventy-five links, west four chains and thirty-four links, and 154 degrees three chains and seven links; again on the south by a road bearing west one chain and forty-eight links to Normanby Gully; and on the south-west and north-west by the right bank of that gully downwards to the point of commencement;—as shown on plan of survey deposited in the Surveyor-General's Office.

The boundaries of the Petty Debts Districts of Bowen and Ravenswood have been amended, and are now as follows:—

PETTY SESSIONS DISTRICT OF BOWEN.

Commencing at the mouth of Wangaratta Creek, and bounded thence by that creek upwards to the northern boundary of portion 333, parish of Tondara; thence by the northern, the eastern, and part of the southern boundary of that portion, and the eastern boundary of the parish of Tondara southerly to the northern boundary of Strathbogie Run, by that boundary west to the Bogie River, and by that river downwards to the Burdekin River; thence by the Burdekin River upwards to the north-west corner of Wickham; thence by the northern and eastern boundaries of Wickham and a line southerly to the north-west corner of the resumed part of Heidelberg Run, by the western boundary thereof southerly to the Leichhardt Range, by that range and a line westerly again to the Burdekin River at the north-east corner of the leased part of Mount McConnell Run; thence by the Burdekin River upwards to the Suttor River, and by that river upwards, and a line bearing north again to the Leichhardt Range near the source of Cerito Creek, by that range easterly to the eastern watershed of Cerito and Kangaroo Creeks, by that watershed northerly to the west corner of Appin Block; thence by the north-western boundaries of Appin and Mount Lawson, the west and north boundaries of Beckford Downs and a line bearing north along the east boundary of Collingwood to the southern watershed of the Andromache River by that watershed north-westerly and by a line bearing north-east passing through Mount Hector to the Andromache River, by that river and the O'Connell River downwards to the coast; and thence by the coast north-westerly to the point of commencement; inclusive of the islands lying between the coast and the boundary line of the colony, as defined in the Schedule to the Act 43 Victoria Number 1.

PETTY SESSIONS DISTRICT OF RAVENSWOOD.

Commencing at the confluence of the Bowen and Burdekin Rivers, and bounded thence by a line west to the north-eastern watershed of the Upper Burdekin River, by that watershed north-westerly and a line south to the northern bend of the Kirk River, by that river and Pandanus Creek downwards to the Burdekin River, by that river downwards to the north-east corner of the leased part of Mount McConnell Run; thence by a line and the Leichhardt Range easterly to the south-west corner of the resumed part of Heidelberg Run, by the western boundary thereof and a line northerly to the south-east corner of Wickham, by the eastern and northern boundaries of Wickham northerly and westerly to the Burdekin River, and thence by that river upwards to the point of commencement.

On Etheridge Gold Field.

County of Gilbert, town of Mount Hogan.

Area—3 roods 19½ perches.

Commencing at a point bearing 197 degrees 30 minutes and distant three chains and seventy-two links from the intersection of the south-west side of Mount street with the south-east side of Hill street, and bounded thence on the north-east by a line bearing 107 degrees 30 minutes five chains and thirty-three links; on the south-east by a line bearing 197 degrees 30 minutes one chain and sixty-four links; on the south-west by a line bearing 287 degrees 30 minutes five chains and thirty-three links; and on the north-west by Hill street bearing 17 degrees 30 minutes one chain and sixty-four links to the point of commencement; as shown on plan of survey deposited in the Surveyor-General's Office.

SMALLPOX.

REGULATIONS OF THE CENTRAL BOARD OF HEALTH FOR THE TREATMENT OF PERSONS AFFECTED WITH SMALLPOX, AND FOR PREVENTING THE SPREAD OF THAT DISEASE.

In pursuance of the powers conferred upon them by "*The Health Act of 1884*," the Central Board of Health, subject to the approval of the Governor in Council, have made and established the following Regulations for the treatment of persons affected with Smallpox, and for preventing the spread of that disease:—

Definitions.

1. In these Regulations—

"Minister" means the Colonial Secretary or other Minister charged for the time being with the performance of his duties;

"Ship" includes vessel or boat;

"Officer of Customs" includes any Officer of Customs;

"Master" includes the officer or person for the time being in charge or command of a ship;

"Medical Officer of Health" means a legally qualified medical practitioner holding the office of a Government Medical Officer.

Cases of suspected smallpox to be reported.

2. When there is reason to believe or suspect that any person is suffering from smallpox, the person in charge of the house or other place where the person so suspected to be suffering is, or, in case such person is on board of a ship lying in port, the master of the ship shall forthwith report the fact to a Medical Officer of Health, and if he cannot make a report to such Officer immediately, shall make immediate report to a Police Magistrate or Officer of Police.

In the case of a ship, the master shall also report the fact to an Officer of Customs.

When any case of suspected smallpox comes under the observation of a legally qualified medical practitioner, he shall forthwith make a like report to the same officer or officers.

Premises or ship to be isolated, and notice to be affixed or flag hoisted.

3. It shall be the duty of the Medical Officer of Health, Police Magistrate, Officer of Customs, or Officer of Police, to whom any such report is made, to make immediate provision for preventing any person from leaving the premises or ship (as the case may be) where the person so suspected to be suffering then is, until the examination hereinafter prescribed has been made by a Medical Officer of Health, and for that purpose he may station guards upon or near the premises or ship, and use or cause to be used such force as may be necessary to prevent any person from leaving the premises or ship.

It shall also be his duty to prevent, by force if necessary, any person from entering such premises or ship unless permitted by a Medical Officer of Health.

He shall also cause to be affixed to the premises, if on land, a notice indicating that they are suspected to be infected with smallpox, and in the case of a ship shall cause the yellow flag to be hoisted.

Ship to be detained and anchored.

4. It shall be the duty of the Officer of Customs to whom any such report is made to detain the ship and to order the master forthwith to moor or anchor the same in such position as such Officer of Customs shall direct; and thereupon the master shall forthwith moor or anchor the ship accordingly.

No person to leave or enter premises or ship.

5. No person shall, without the consent of a Medical Officer of Health, leave or enter any such premises or ship after such notice is affixed, or such flag is hoisted, until the examination hereinafter prescribed has been made, and if any person leaves or attempts to leave the premises or ship contrary to these Regulations, he may be taken into custody and returned to the premises or ship, or conveyed to some hospital or place appointed for that purpose by the Minister, as the Medical Officer of Health may direct.

Police Magistrate or Officer of Police to give notice to Medical Officer of Health.

6. When a report is made to a Police Magistrate or Officer of Police he shall forthwith give notice thereof to a Medical Officer of Health.

Officer of Customs to give notice to Medical Officer of Health of detention of ship.

7. When an Officer of Customs detains a ship as aforesaid, he shall forthwith give notice thereof, and of the cause of such detention, to a Medical Officer of Health.

Period of detention of ship.

8. The detention of a ship by an Officer of Customs shall cease as soon as the ship has been duly visited and examined by a Medical Officer of Health, unless the ship is, upon such examination, found to be infected with smallpox, in which case the ship shall be detained until the Minister orders it to be released, and shall in the meantime be moored or anchored in such prescribed place as the Medical Officer of Health may direct.

Medical Officer of Health to make examination and furnish certificate.

9. The Medical Officer of Health shall, as soon as possible after any such report as aforesaid is made to him, proceed to examine the person suspected to be suffering from smallpox, and all other persons found upon the premises or ship in which he is; and all persons in respect of whom he shall not give a certificate as provided by the two next following Regulations shall be allowed to leave the premises or ship on stating their names and the places of their destination.

Persons suffering from smallpox to be removed, where practicable, to hospital or other place appointed.

10. If the Medical Officer of Health certifies that any person on the premises or ship is suffering from smallpox he may be removed, if his condition will admit of such removal, to some hospital or place appointed for that purpose by the Minister. And no person so removed shall leave such hospital or place until the Medical Officer of Health has certified that he is free from smallpox.

If any person suffering from smallpox cannot be removed, or for any reason it is not desirable to remove him, the premises or ship shall remain subject, for the purposes of these Regulations, to the control of the Medical Officer of Health, and such person shall not be removed from or leave the premises or ship, except with the consent, in writing, of the Medical Officer of Health.

Persons suspected of suffering from smallpox to be detained or removed.

11. If the Medical Officer of Health certifies that any person on the premises or ship is suffering from an illness which the Medical Officer of Health suspects may prove to be smallpox, or that it is desirable that any such person should be detained for further observation, such person may either be detained in the premises or ship where he is found, for such period as the Medical Officer of Health directs, or may be taken to some hospital or place appointed for that purpose by the Minister, and detained there for a like period, in order that it may be ascertained whether he is or is not suffering from smallpox.

NAVIGATING ARCHIVE CD BOOKS CDs

All Archive CD Books products can be navigated easily using the handy bookmarks on each CD. The table of contents in most original books, and the original book index where it exists, can provide additional ways of finding the information required.

SEARCHING TEXT ON ARCHIVE CD BOOKS AUSTRALIA CDs

Optical Character Recognition (OCR) technology has been developing over the years as a useful mechanism to convert images (as Archive CD Books pages are) into text which can be searched.

The quality of the OCR can still vary, and hence the searchability can vary. Around 95% or 99% of the words in books with good type are searchable—or even higher with very good type.

*OCR is now a wonderful searching aid in many instances
but there is still no substitute for reading the book!*

DIFFERENT VERSIONS OF ADOBE ACROBAT READER

Adobe Acrobat Reader 4 or later should be used. Adobe Reader 6 (as it is now named) in fact has considerably better searching options and is recommended.

- **Acrobat Reader v4** has both a "Find" and a "Search" tool. Those tools are two **totally** different things. Our CDs (that are searchable) work with the **FIND** tool
- **Acrobat Reader v5** has only a "Find" tool (not a "search" tool). Our CDs (that are searchable) work with the **FIND** tool.
- **Adobe Reader v6** has only a "Search" tool (not a tool labelled "Find")
HOWEVER — what is called "Search" is the same as the tool that used to be called "Find" Our CDs (that are searchable) work with the **SEARCH** tool

TIPS FOR SEARCHING AND GETTING MORE FROM THE CD BOOKS

- update to Adobe Reader 6 for more versatile searching options, including the ability to bring up a list of all instances of the word you are searching for — across multiple files on a single CD in a single search request.
- enter the MINIMUM number of characters needed to bring up the search results required.
- use Adobe Reader 6 to do some trial searches to try to identify the characters that may be misread. These can show up in the extra text in the search results list (Adobe 6 only). A few minutes trial will help you to avoid using characters that are more prone to being misread, e.g. try entering "rederi" if you want "Frederick", but find that the letters "F" "c" and "k" are sometimes misread.
- use the "Match whole word" option to eliminate unnecessary items in your results list, e.g. to eliminate all the blacksmiths and tinsmiths etc when you only want the name Smith
- use the "Match case" option when you want to eliminate all the occupations "smith" if you only want the name "Smith"
- Don't just search for names. Search the book for other names, places and subjects of interest:
 - look for others of the same name
 - look for others who lived in the same place or street
 - who was the postmaster or police officer in the town?
 - how often and at what time did the coach arrive in town?
 - what churches were there and what time were services held?
 - what other activities were there in the community?
 - look for others who had the same occupation or other interests
- All of this and more may be available in a seemingly mundane book such as a directory. You could learn or write much of the background of life at the time, even if your ancestor is not listed there.

ADOBE ACROBAT SEARCHING IS A WONDERFUL FIRST FINDING AID.
BUT DO NOT RELY ON IT TO PICK UP ALL THE INFORMATION YOU WANT
