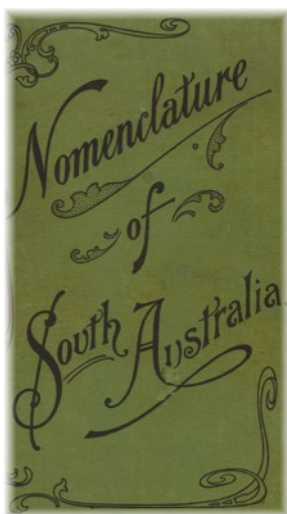

P R E F A C E .

ALTHOUGH the contents of this book cover the wide range of 1,200 names, the Nomenclature of South Australia still offers much scope for investigation, and, with a view to the production of a second and more complete edition at a later date, contributions breaking new ground or amplifying the information herein presented will be welcomed at *The Register* Office. The author wishes to acknowledge the valuable and indispensable assistance which he received in the preparation of these articles from Mr. Charles Hope Harris, of Upper Kensington, and Mr. Horace Cobden Talbot, of Glenelg. Many of the derivations recorded are the result of original research on their part, while the proof sheets of the whole underwent revision at their hands. Both gentlemen proved themselves possessed of a fund of knowledge on the subject, and without their ready co-operation the nomenclatural history of South Australia would have remained hopelessly incomplete. The thanks of the author are also offered to Mr. John Bagot, of North Terrace, Adelaide, for the enthusiastic and practical aid which he gave in clearing up many obscure derivations, and to Mr. W. H. Ifould, Second Librarian at the Public Library, Mr. C. B. Gross, Assistant Librarian at the Parliamentary Library, and Mr. T. S. Reed, Secretary to the South Australian Branch of the Royal Geographical Society, for access to helpful works of reference.

CHAPTER I.—A.

—Adelaide, the Capital.—

Reviewing our nomenclature in alphabetical order, it is appropriate to deal first with the capital, Adelaide, which, by royal command, was named after the consort of King William IV. Queen Adelaide died in 1849. Her Majesty was proud of the compliment paid to her in the new province of the Empire, and when her will was examined it was found that she had made a liberal donation from her library to the public authorities in South Australia. These books are now on the shelves of the Public Library, and the Board of Governors also possesses several autograph and holograph letters obtained from the same source. Queen Adelaide was a woman of deep piety, in proof of which it is interesting to quote the letter she wrote giving instructions concerning her funeral. The original document is kept in the strongroom of the Public Library, and reads:—

DIRECTIONS FOR MY FUNERAL.

I die in all humility, knowing well that we are all alike before the throne of God, and I request therefore that my mortal remains be conveyed to the grave without any pomp or state. They are to be moved to St. George's Chapel, Windsor, where I request to have as private and quiet a funeral as possible. I particularly desire not to be laid out in state, and the funeral to take place by daylight, no procession, the coffin to be carried by sailors to the chapel. All those of my friends and relations to a limited number who wish to attend may do so. My nephew, Pr. Edward of S.W., Lords Howe and Denbigh, the Honble. W. Ashley, Mr. Wood, Sir A. Barnard, and Sir A. Davies, with my dressers and those of my ladies who may wish to attend. I die in peace, and wish to be carried to the tomb in peace and free from the vanities and the pomp of this world. I request not to be dissected nor embalmed, and desire to give as little trouble as possible. I shall die in peace with the world, and full of gratitude for all the

kindness that was ever shown to me, and in full reliance to the mercy of our Saviour, Jesus Christ, in whose hands I commit my soul.

—Might Have Been Wellington.—

Only students of South Australia's earliest history are aware of the fact that the capital escaped the name of Wellington. At the time the hero of Waterloo was a commanding figure in the House of Lords, and he undertook to give dispatch to the passage of the all-important South Australian Colonization Bill. He secured its adoption and in recognition of his efforts three of the promoters of the colony promised that the capital should bear his name. That promise was not fulfilled, much to the disgust of those who had made it. Edward Gibbon Wakefield placed it on record that he was "shabbily frustrated" in his desire to call the capital Wellington. The name of the illustrious Duke, however, appears twice on the map of South Australia, and the places referred to will be mentioned in their proper order. It must be admitted that to have had Wellington as the capital of New Zealand and Wellington as the capital of South Australia would have led to much confusion in postal matters, so that Adelaide was a better choice.

—Tandaroya.—

The natives knew the site of Adelaide as Tandarnya, but no meaning of the word has been handed down. Here may be inserted a legend of the aboriginal tribes who inhabited the district around the capital. It was told in the early days, and put into verse by "Link Luckhurst":—

In the land of Tandarnya lived Nanto Boorkoo,
A red-haired, white-headed "old man" kangaroo.
As an infant, named Tarmia, from cloudland he came,
In a fur-lined skin bag of traditional fame.

LIMERICK'S GREATEST GENIUS.

To the Editor.

The facts concerning the naming of Port Elliston are these. In the early settlement of the west coast Mr. Hamp (father of the late J. C. Hamp) was killed by the natives. The settlers, not being able to get redress from Adelaide, took the matter in their own hands, and rounded the blacks up and drove them towards the sea cliffs. Those that did not jump were shot as they stood, and for this reason the bay was called Waterloo Bay. In 1871 Messrs. Acraman, Main, Lindsay, & Co. induced me to open this Waterloo Bay, which I did with my vessel the Prima Donna. On the second trip I took my wife, who was the first white woman to sail into the bay. When Mr. Hamp came on board with other settlers he wanted to rechristen the bay after my wife or the vessel. I asked them the origin of Waterloo Bay, and they told me it was named so on account of the battle with the blacks. I requested them to let it still remain Waterloo, for it was a national name. Some years later it was called Port Elliston, after a maiden lady who was school teacher at Mr. J. Hamp's place. Her name was Ella Liston, and

HUMBUG SCRUB.

To the Editor.

Sir—Having seen by The Evening Journal of yesterday's date that you were wanting to know why Humberg Scrub was so called, I have much pleasure in giving you the following information:—My father, the late H. H. Blackham, who resided in the Onetree Hill district from 1841 to the time of his death in 1900, often told the story of how the scrub was first called "Humberg." Early in the fifties a woodsplitter and his wife were camped in the scrub about five miles east from Onetree Hill. One day this woman called at our house, and my father asked her how she liked the scrub. She replied—"I call it Humberg," putting a strong emphasis on the last word. This strange name caused some little amusement, and from that day the name became associated with the hitherto nameless scrub which lies between the River Torrens and Barossa. Many years afterwards the Lady Alice Mine was discovered in Hamlyn's Gully, near the northern end of the scrub, and the postal name given to that settlement was Humberg Scrub.

HINDMARSH VALLEY OR NANGAWOOKA?

To the Editor.

Sir—Close to the finger-post on the Victor Harbour road, and about three miles equidistant from the abovenamed place and Port Elliot, is the foot of a remarkable spur that juts out from the Brownhill Range about a mile away. This spur, although exceedingly rocky, abounds in quartz veins, through which runs a constant supply of the purest and most delicious water. The springs, which are numerous, vary much in the quantity produced. Some of them yield as much as 1½ galls. a minute. The name Nangawooka was given to me more than 50 years ago by two old men of the Encounter Bay tribe. It means "The place of springs." This tribe had its district from "The Needles," on the Coorong, to the Bluff at Encounter Bay, and did most of the reaping in the Hindmarsh and Inman Valleys 55 years ago. This was before the Federal Parliament had put a heavy tax on patent harvesters, and indeed on every other useful commodity the people have a desire for. The tribe of which I have been speaking came regularly year by year, and in an adjoining paddock performed the obsequies on all their relatives who had recently died, and whose bodies they carried on their backs to perform the last rites in this favoured spot. The lubras made the night hideous with their weird cries and incessant battering of their skin drums. There are piles of ashes feet high still remaining where the bodies were hung up for smoking before they were considered fit for interment, which was carried out mostly in the thick branches of a large sheoak, where the bodies remained till decayed by the weather. Two of the best reapers of the tribe were George Cornish, a halfcaste, and his wife Margaret, also a halfcaste. She was a pretty girl at that

CHAPTER XIII.—N. AND O.

—A Populous Suburb.—

Norwood received its name from the town of similar designation near London. The oldest part of it was laid out by Mr. Samuel Reeves in 1838, and several years later it was added to by Messrs. Robert Miller, William Anderson Bryden, William Paxton, and Henry Collier, who, acting as a company, agreed to a certain design for a town showing streets and a limited number of allotments of various sizes, the original plan of which cannot be traced. The vendors of the allotments were those mentioned above, and some of the streets are named after members of their families. One of the earliest residents of Norwood was Charles Bonney, then Commissioner of Crown Lands and afterwards first Mayor of the town. Kensington and Norwood were the first suburban townships to be granted separate municipal government. (July 7, 1853.) Robert Harrison wrote apparently in haste when, in his "Colonial Sketches," he referred contemptuously to Norwood as "a village; in fact, another square mile of imaginary streets in imitation of the great metropolis."

—Famous for its Caves.—

Narracoorte is a name that would scarcely be recognised by the natives who gave it to us. The late Mr. William McIntosh, who laid out the adjoining town of Kincraig in 1850, said that the name Narracoorte was known as far back as 1845. The town was laid out by the Government in 1850. The late Dr. Gunning, who settled there in 1849, in a letter to the late Mr. A. T. Magarey in 1863, said that the name should be Gnanga-kurt, but did not give the meaning of it. Mr. Magarey stated that his father, who was at Narracoorte in 1861, was told by the blacks that the name was

Nanna-coorta. Mr. McIntosh recorded that the word meant "large water-hole." Mr. A. Caldwell, proprietor of the local Herald, wrote as follows, in reply to an enquiry from the writer:—"Dying legends state that Narracoorte derived its name from Narcoot, a native appellation of a waterhole somewhere in the neighbourhood, the locality of which is not generally known. Its residents and the general public call the town Narracoorte, but the Government departments drop an R. For some years after its settlement the business portion of the present Narracoorte was known as Kincraig, the name of the birthplace in Scotland of the late Mr. W. McIntosa, founder of the town. That name is now almost forgotten, and is used only on official documents." The late James McLean, Sheriffs officer, referred to Narcoota Springs in one of his reports, and Tolmer to Narcoota Springs. Who shall decide between these multifarious corruptions? The discovery of beautiful caves a few miles from the town has given favour to the place among tourists.

—Miss Nairne.—

Nairne and the surrounding district were originally owned by the late Mr. Matthew Smillie, who on January 26, 1839, applied for a block of 4,000 acres of land as a special survey at the source of the Onkaparinga, north of Mount Barker. He selected land there in what is now the Hundred of Kamantoo. At the end of 1840 he laid out a portion of his land as a town, and called it Nairne after the maiden name of his wife — Miss Elizabeth Corse Nairne, whom he had married some years before in Scotland. Mr. S. Sanders did much of the surveying of the land, which was eventually resold. The final sales took place in

Getting around this CD

Navigating Archive CD Books CDs

All Archive CD Books products can be navigated easily using the handy bookmarks on each CD. The table of contents in most original books, and the original book index where it exists, can provide additional ways of finding the information required.

Searching Text on Archive CD Books Australia CDs

Optical Character Recognition (OCR) technology has been developing over the years as a useful mechanism to convert images (as Archive CD Books pages are) into text which can be searched. The quality of the OCR can still vary, and hence the searchability can vary. Around 95% or 99% of the words in books with good type are searchable—or even higher with very good type.

*OCR is now a wonderful searching aid in many instances
but there is still no substitute for reading the book!*

Different Versions of Adobe Acrobat Reader

Adobe Acrobat Reader 4 or later should be used. Adobe Reader 6 (as it is now named) in fact has considerably better searching options and is recommended.

- **Acrobat Reader v4** has both a “Find” and a “Search” tool. Those tools are two **totally** different things. Our CDs (that are searchable) work with the **FIND** tool
- **Acrobat Reader v5** has only a “Find” tool (not a “search” tool). Our CDs (that are searchable) work with the **FIND** tool.
- **Adobe Reader v6** has only a “Search” tool (not a tool labelled “Find”). HOWEVER — what is called “Search” is the same as the tool that used to be called “Find” Our CDs (that are searchable) work with the **SEARCH** tool

Tips For Searching and Getting More From the CD Books

- update to Adobe Reader 6 for more versatile searching options, including the ability to bring up a list of all instances of the word you are searching for — across multiple files on a single CD in a single search request.
- enter the **MINIMUM** number of characters needed to bring up the search results required.
- use Adobe Reader 6 to do some trial searches to try to identify the characters that may be misread. These can show up in the extra text in the search results list (Adobe 6 only). A few minutes trial will help you to avoid using characters that are more prone to being misread, e.g. try entering “rederi” if you want “Frederick”, but find that the letters “F” “c” and “k” are sometimes misread.
- use the “Match whole word” option to eliminate unnecessary items in your results list, e.g. to eliminate all the blacksmiths and tinsmiths etc when you only want the name Smith.
- use the “Match case” option to eliminate all the occupations “smith” if you only want the name “Smith”.
- don’t just search for names. Search the book for other names, places and subjects of interest:
 - › look for others of the same name
 - › look for others who lived in the same place or street
 - › who was the postmaster or police officer in the town?
 - › how often and at what time did the coach arrive in town?
 - › what churches were there and what time were services held?
 - › what other activities were there in the community?
 - › look for others who had the same occupation or other interests
- all of this and more may be available in a seemingly mundane book such as a directory. You can learn much of the background of life at the time, even if your ancestor is not listed there.
- Many CDs have only one file, but some have the book content spread over several files. Adobe Reader normally searches in the file that is open at the time. If you wish to search ALL files at once choose the “All PDF documents in” option and select the CD drive or directory the files are in—Adobe Reader 6 only.
