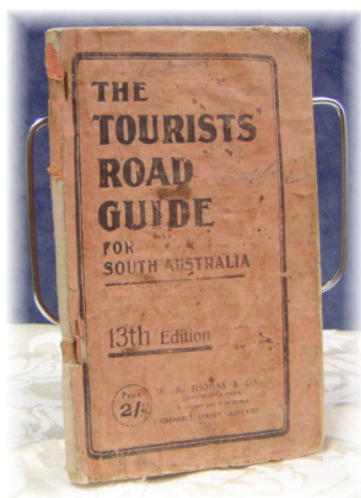

Generally speaking, the roads are in good condition, especially in the hills districts. The gradients are occasionally steep, and in the interests of personal and public safety care should at all times be exercised in driving round sharp curves and down steep hills.

The various District Councils and the Automobile Association of S.A. have erected suitable warning and direction boards in many localities frequented by Tourists.

Motorists will thoroughly appreciate the coastal run from Seacliff to the Outer Harbour, passing through Brighton, Glenelg, Henley Beach, The Grange, and Semaphore. Although compelled to leave the sea frontage at certain points, the route lies sufficiently close to the shore to enable tourists to enjoy the fresh air and views of the Gulf. This is always a very popular short jaunt for Saturdays and Sundays.

Places of Interest Within Easy Radius.

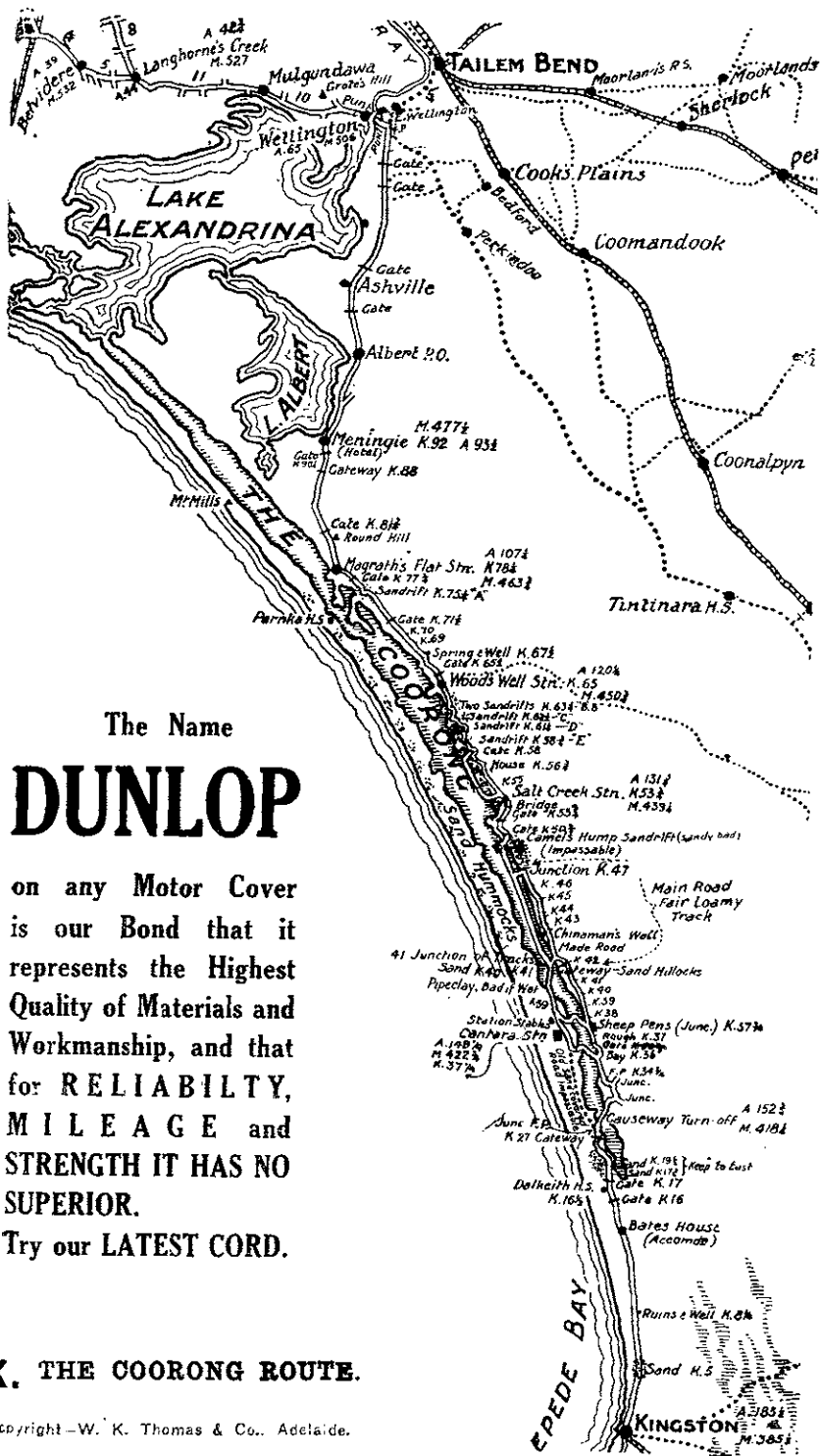
ALDGATE—

East (hills)—12½ miles. Market gardening and nurseries. Favourite residential district. One hotel. Follow Glen Osmond tramline via Wakefield and Hutt Street, through South Park Lands to terminus at the Glen. Then continue through range past Mountain Hut, round the bend at Leawood Gardens, and Eagle-on-the-Hill Hotel to the summit of the hill at Crafers. Then the road continues with easy gradients to Stirling East and Aldgate. A delightful panorama of the plains and sea may be viewed from the Eagle.

AMBLESIDE—

East (hills)—17¾ miles. Fruitgrowing and dairying. Two hotels. Follow directions to Aldgate, turn to left at Hotel, descend Vimy Hill to junction of roads, and

K. THE COORONG ROUTE.

BEACHPORT—

28 miles from Robe. On coast; terminus of railway from Mt. Gambier. At one time this town was an important Government depot, and several substantial buildings were erected. There is a jetty and wharf for shipping purposes—wool, wheat, barley, and skins; and across a narrow strip of water a substantial lighthouse affords warning to vessels bound east or west across the Southern Ocean. As a marine health resort Beachport is very popular.

MILLICENT—

Is reached via Furner (33 miles). The route is shown on map of South-East. This town is the centre of a very flourishing farming and stock breeding district. On main track Adelaide to Melbourne. Three hotels. Good accommodation for tourists. Several garages and mechanics. Passing through Tantanoola (9 miles) the route leads to Mount Gambier.

MOUNT GAMBIER—

29 miles from Millicent—297 miles from Adelaide. This is the largest and most important provincial town in South Australia. Long established, sound commercially and financially, the district has enabled the town to base its public and social institutions on a sound foundation. The extent of business and solidity of its public, official, and religious buildings are striking evidence of prosperity. The chief attractions for tourists are the bracing, health-restoring climate, beautiful surroundings, including large park-like estates, prolific cereal and dairy products; the famous Blue and other Lakes, Gordon's Monument, magnificent views from tower at summit of the Mount, enjoyable drives to MacDonnell Bay (in which district is situated Dingley Dell, the old home of the poet Gordon, now the property of the State).

When two or more cars belonging to the same owner are loaded in one truck the rate for the second and other cars will be as under:—

Up to and including 20 cwt.	7d. per mile, minimum 23/4.
Up to and including 30 cwt.	1/- per mile, minimum 23/4.

These cars can not be carried by express trains, and only by other passenger trains at the option of the Railways Commissioner.

Motor vehicles are not accepted for conveyance if containing petrol or other inflammable liquid or spirit.

The above rates include ropes, loading, and unloading.

Tricycles and other cycling machines to convey more than one person will be carried under the above conditions at double the above rates.

Motor bicycles will be carried at ordinary parcels rate.

Sidecars run in connection with motor bicycles will be charged double that for bicycles as above. In every instance the sidecar must be detached from the motor bicycle, the latter being charged ordinary parcels rate.

Covers for the protection of bicycles may be hired at Adelaide Station. The charge is fourpence each for journeys up to fifty miles; sevenpence each for journeys over fifty miles, in addition to ordinary freight.

THE ROAD TO GUMERACHA.

An Entrancing Corridor.

If an unlabelled moving picture of the Gorge road to Gumeracha were thrown on the screen people would ask where it was. The route is an eye-opener in rugged beauty. For most of the 17 miles, from the time the gateway is entered at Athelstone the track runs between massive, rock-ribbed, tree-spread cliffs which climb hundreds of feet and seem to meet the blue sky. From the moment you get into contact with the great panorama it is a wonderland of wild, decorative effects, carried out by Nature to big scale. The road has the appearance of a bold, tiny interloper twisting in and out among the boulders with flimsy and almost precarious audacity. Looking up on one side you see the hills, mottled by shadows on a sunny afternoon, lean their grey bulk against a radiant background. On the other the jagged, broken rocks offer, at times, a rather uncomfortable proximity supplying a striking colour contrast with their red and dark-blue and brown faces. Running along this 24-ft. thoroughfare, amid some of the most impressive open-air sculpture to be seen in Australia, you involuntarily duck now and then in expectation of being hit by one of these giant fists. Then, right underneath, flows with placid grace, the little creek, framed in brilliant green rushes or tender fern. When the towering avenues disappear, as it were, into the wings of this magnificent stage, there come through the scattered gums glimpses of fruit gardens, designed as symmetrically as a draughtboard, or arranged in marvellous rows of potato and tomato plants, suggesting the faultless elegance of the top lines in a copy-book. So you get on this excursion up the Gorge road the blend of dainty, man-made utilities and the moving grandeur of God-made scenery.

Getting around this CD

Navigating Archive CD Books CDs

All Archive CD Books products can be navigated easily using the handy bookmarks on each CD. The table of contents in most original books, and the original book index where it exists, can provide additional ways of finding the information required.

Searching Text on Archive CD Books Australia CDs

Optical Character Recognition (OCR) technology has been developing over the years as a useful mechanism to convert images (as Archive CD Books pages are) into text which can be searched. The quality of the OCR can still vary, and hence the searchability can vary. Around 95% or 99% of the words in books with good type are searchable—or even higher with very good type.

*OCR is now a wonderful searching aid in many instances
but there is still no substitute for reading the book!*

Different Versions of Adobe Acrobat Reader

Adobe Acrobat Reader 4 or later should be used. Adobe Reader 6 (as it is now named) in fact has considerably better searching options and is recommended.

- **Acrobat Reader v4** has both a “Find” and a “Search” tool. Those tools are two *totally* different things. Our CDs (that are searchable) work with the *FIND* tool
- **Acrobat Reader v5** has only a “Find” tool (not a “search” tool). Our CDs (that are searchable) work with the *FIND* tool.
- **Adobe Reader v6** has only a “Search” tool (not a tool labelled “Find”). HOWEVER — what is called “Search” is the same as the tool that used to be called “Find” Our CDs (that are searchable) work with the *SEARCH* tool

Tips For Searching and Getting More From the CD Books

- update to Adobe Reader 6 for more versatile searching options, including the ability to bring up a list of all instances of the word you are searching for — across multiple files on a single CD in a single search request.
- enter the MINIMUM number of characters needed to bring up the search results required.
- use Adobe Reader 6 to do some trial searches to try to identify the characters that may be misread. These can show up in the extra text in the search results list (Adobe 6 only). A few minutes trial will help you to avoid using characters that are more prone to being misread, e.g. try entering “rederi” if you want “Frederick”, but find that the letters “F” “c” and “k” are sometimes misread.
- use the “Match whole word” option to eliminate unnecessary items in your results list, e.g. to eliminate all the blacksmiths and tinsmiths etc when you only want the name Smith.
- use the “Match case” option to eliminate all the occupations “smith” if you only want the name “Smith”.
- don’t just search for names. Search the book for other names, places and subjects of interest:
 - › look for others of the same name
 - › look for others who lived in the same place or street
 - › who was the postmaster or police officer in the town?
 - › how often and at what time did the coach arrive in town?
 - › what churches were there and what time were services held?
 - › what other activities were there in the community?
 - › look for others who had the same occupation or other interests
- all of this and more may be available in a seemingly mundane book such as a directory. You can learn much of the background of life at the time, even if your ancestor is not listed there.
- Many CDs have only one file, but some have the book content spread over several files. Adobe Reader normally searches in the file that is open at the time. If you wish to search ALL files at once choose the “All PDF documents in” option and select the CD drive or directory the files are in—Adobe Reader 6 only.
