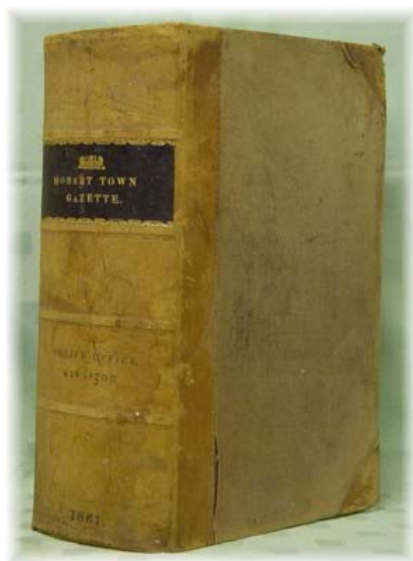

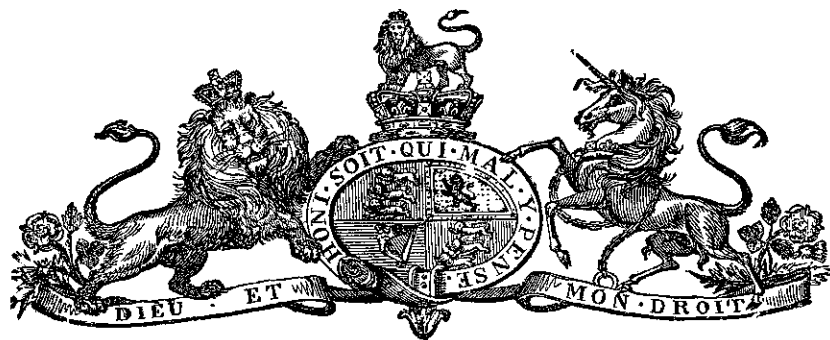

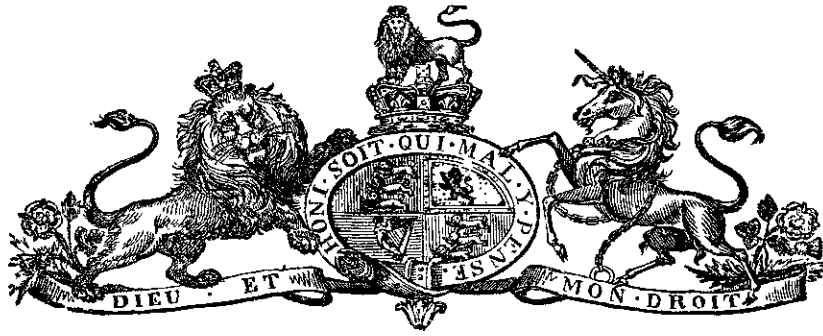

THE Board of Immigration directs the re-publication of the Scale of payments, as promulgated under date 21st December, 1858, under which persons desirous of introducing Immigrants from the United Kingdom may obtain Bounty Tickets, upon application to George Smith, Esq., the Immigration Agent, Hobart Town, or to John Thompson, Esq., the Immigration Agent, Launceston.

PAYMENTS required from Applicants.

For a Family Ticket, including a man and his wife, with all their children under 12 years of age at the time of embarkation £15
 For a Ticket for a Single Female £5
 For a Ticket for a Single Male £10
 All Children of 12 years of age and upwards at the time of embarkation are to be considered as Adults, and must each have a separate Single Ticket.

BOUNTY Rates of Passage-money.

For each Adult £16
 For each Child of 3 years of age and under 12 at the time of embarkation £8
 For each Child under 3 years of age at the time of embarkation £4
 In the event of the death of an Emigrant on the voyage, one-half the above Rates will be paid.

REGULATIONS.

1. Forms for signature by Applicants to be obtained from the Immigration Agent at Hobart Town or Launceston, and at the different Police Offices in the Interior.

2. The "Engagement" set out in the Bounty Ticket must be signed by the Emigrant (for himself and Family), agreeing not to leave Tasmania within four years after arrival without having previously paid to the Immigration Agent at Hobart Town or Launceston one-fourth of the whole cost of the Passage-money for every year wanting to complete four years' residence in the Colony, and a proportionate sum for every part of a year.

3. Persons who introduce Immigrants under these Regulations must provide for their reception on arrival.

Should any such Immigrants be received into a Government Establishment, a charge of Two Shillings a day, or part of a day, for each individual will be made against the introducer.

A PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR HENRY EDWARD FOX YOUNG, Knight, Companion of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of Tasmania and its Dependencies.

IT SIR HENRY EDWARD FOX YOUNG, Knight, Companion of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of Tasmania and its Dependencies, in exercise of the powers conferred upon me by Act of Council (8 Victoria, No. 13), do, by this my Proclamation, notify and proclaim the Rural Municipality of Clarence to be a District for the purposes of holding Courts of General and Quarter Sessions of the Peace in Tasmania and its Dependencies: And I do appoint that on, from, and after the Twenty-first day of January instant, the place for holding such Courts shall be Bellerive, in Tasmania aforesaid; and the times for holding such Courts as aforesaid shall be the last Friday in the Months of January, April, July, and October

DEGREE OF ASSOCIATE OF ARTS.

THE second Examination for the Degree of Associate of Arts will take place some time between the first day of September and the last day of November, 1861. The conditions upon which honors are given, prizes are awarded, and the Degree is granted, are stated in the Rules and Regulations of Council, a copy of which will be furnished by the undersigned on application.

A list of subjects and books is appended. It must, however, be clearly borne in mind, that to obtain the Degree it is only necessary to pass in four of these subjects, of which Latin or Mathematics must be one.

PRELIMINARY EXAMINATION FOR THE DEGREE OF ASSOCIATE OF ARTS.

PREVIOUSLY to the examination for the Degree of Associate of Arts, every Candidate will be required to satisfy the Examiners in—

1. Reading aloud a passage from some English prose author. All that is required from Candidates is that they should pronounce correctly, articulate distinctly, and read intelligibly.
2. Writing from dictation.
3. The Analysis and Parsing of a passage from some standard English author.
4. The first four Rules of Arithmetic, Simple and Compound.
5. Geography. Under this head a competent knowledge will be required of the chief ranges of mountains, the principal rivers, the principal towns, and the coast line of one or more of the countries in the following list:—England, Scotland, Ireland, Europe, Asia, Africa, North America, South America, Australasia.
6. The outlines of English History since the Conquest; that is to say, the succession of Sovereigns, the chief events, and some account of the leading men in each reign.

EXAMINATION FOR THE DEGREE OF ASSOCIATE OF ARTS.

The examination for those Students who have satisfactorily passed the preliminary examination will comprise the subjects mentioned in the following ten sections, in four of which at least, Latin or Pure Mathematics being one, the Candidate must satisfy the Examiners:—

SKETCH of the second Examination for the Degree of ASSOCIATE OF ARTS.

ENGLISH.—The Candidate will be examined in the Etymology and Grammatical construction of the Language; in English History, from the Conquest to the Accession of Henry VIII.; and will be required to write a short original composition, or a Report founded upon some abstract of facts furnished to him. He will also be examined in Physical, Commercial, and Political Geography. Books recommended. Trench on the Study of Words, (3s. 6d., Parker) Morell's Grammar and Analysis, with Graduated Exercises, (2s. 6d., Constable) Cornwell's School Geography (3s. 6d., Simpkin & Co.), and Hughes's Physical Geography (3s. 6d., Longman.)

LATIN.—Virgil, *Æneid*, Book VI., or Horace Odes, Books I. and II.; and Sallust, Jugurthine War, or Cicero, Orations against Catiline, 1, 2, and 3. Questions will also be given on the parsing, and the historical and geographical allusions. An easy passage for translation from some other Latin author, and a passage of English for translation into Latin. Candi-

dates for Honors will be required to satisfy the Examiners in all the four books above named.

GREEK.—Xenophon's *Anabasis*, Book II.; and Homer's *Iliad*, Book I., or Herodotus, Book II., first seventy-six Sections. Questions on the parsing and the historical and geographical allusions. An easy passage for translation from some other Greek author. Candidates for Honors will be required to satisfy the Examiners in all the three books above named.

FRENCH.—Passages will be given from Voltaire's *Charles the XII.* and *Vivet's Chrestomathie* for translation into English, with questions on the parsing, and the historical and geographical allusions. Also, a passage from some other French author for translation into English, and from some English author into French.

GERMAN.—Passages will be given from Schiller's *Revolt of the Netherlands*, or *Wallenstein*, with questions on the parsing and the historical and geographical allusions. Also, a passage from some other German author for translation into English, and from an English author into German.

ITALIAN.—Candidates in this Section will be examined in Silvio Pellico, with questions on the parsing, and grammatical construction; also, a passage from some other Italian author for translation into English, and from an English author into Italian.

PURE MATHEMATICS.—Questions will be set in Euclid, Books I. II. III. IV., Arithmetic and Algebra. Candidates for Honors will also be required to satisfy the Examiners in Euclid, Books VI. and XI., as far as Proposition xxi.; Plane Trigonometry, the use of Logarithms, and Mensuration.

NATURAL PHILOSOPHY.—The Candidate must be prepared to answer questions set in the first 394 Sections of Golding Bird's *Natural Philosophy*, 4th edition, 1854. (12s. 6d., Churchill.)

CHEMISTRY.—The Candidate will be examined in inorganic Chemistry. Book recommended: Wilson's *Chemistry*, 3s., (Chambers' Educational Course.)

ZOOLOGY AND BOTANY.—Elementary questions will be set on the description and classification of animals, their habits and geographical distribution; and on the mercantile and industrial uses of animal products. Also, the description and classification of plants, their uses, and geographical distribution. Plants, and parts of plants, will be given for description. Text Books: Milne Edward's *Zoology*, (7s. 6d., Renshaw), and Lindley's *Elements of Botany*, (12s., Bradbury).

DRAWING AND ARCHITECTURE.—Drawing from the Flat, from Models, from Memory, and in Perspective, and Drawing from Plans, Sections, and Elevations. Design in Pen and Ink and in Colour. A fair degree of skill in freehand drawing will be required, in order that a Student may pass in this Section.

GEOLOGY.—The Candidate will be examined in Page's *Introductory Text Book*, 1s. 6d., and *Advanced Text Books of Geology*, 5s., (Blackwood.)

NAVIGATING ARCHIVE CD BOOKS CDs

All Archive CD Books products can be navigated easily using the handy bookmarks on each CD. The table of contents in most original books, and the original book index where it exists, can provide additional ways of finding the information required.

SEARCHING TEXT ON ARCHIVE CD BOOKS AUSTRALIA CDs

Optical Character Recognition (OCR) technology has been developing over the years as a useful mechanism to convert images (as Archive CD Books pages are) into text which can be searched.

The quality of the OCR can still vary, and hence the searchability can vary. Around 95% or 99% of the words in books with good type are searchable—or even higher with very good type.

*OCR is now a wonderful searching aid in many instances
but there is still no substitute for reading the book!*

DIFFERENT VERSIONS OF ADOBE ACROBAT READER

Adobe Acrobat Reader 4 or later should be used. Adobe Reader 6 (as it is now named) in fact has considerably better searching options and is recommended.

- **Acrobat Reader v4** has both a "Find" and a "Search" tool. Those tools are two *totally* different things. Our CDs (that are searchable) work with the *FIND* tool
- **Acrobat Reader v5** has only a "Find" tool (not a "search" tool). Our CDs (that are searchable) work with the *FIND* tool.
- **Adobe Reader v6** has only a "Search" tool (not a tool labelled "Find")
HOWEVER — what is called "Search" is the same as the tool that used to be called "Find" Our CDs (that are searchable) work with the *SEARCH* tool

TIPS FOR SEARCHING AND GETTING MORE FROM THE CD BOOKS

- update to Adobe Reader 6 for more versatile searching options, including the ability to bring up a list of all instances of the word you are searching for — across multiple files on a single CD in a single search request.
- enter the MINIMUM number of characters needed to bring up the search results required.
- use Adobe Reader 6 to do some trial searches to try to identify the characters that may be misread. These can show up in the extra text in the search results list (Adobe 6 only). A few minutes trial will help you to avoid using characters that are more prone to being misread, e.g. try entering "rederi" if you want "Frederick", but find that the letters "F" "c" and "k" are sometimes misread.
- use the "Match whole word" option to eliminate unnecessary items in your results list, e.g. to eliminate all the blacksmiths and tinsmiths etc when you only want the name Smith
- use the "Match case" option when you want to eliminate all the occupations "smith" if you only want the name "Smith"
- Don't just search for names. Search the book for other names, places and subjects of interest:
 - look for others of the same name
 - look for others who lived in the same place or street
 - who was the postmaster or police officer in the town?
 - how often and at what time did the coach arrive in town?
 - what churches were there and what time were services held?
 - what other activities were there in the community?
 - look for others who had the same occupation or other interests
- All of this and more may be available in a seemingly mundane book such as a directory. You could learn or write much of the background of life at the time, even if your ancestor is not listed there.
